An Online Carnival

This online, interactive course is designed to create and foster an online community of citizens around the world who are committed to helping their local communities look for new insights that offer the promise of *Surviving the Future*. Some communities may choose to follow the possibilities unveiled in David Fleming's works on Lean Logic, Lean Economy, and Lean Culture, while others might use Fleming's work as a springboard for finding their own unique pathways to confronting what Fleming calls the Climacteric, "a stage in the life of a system in which it is especially exposed to a profound change in health or fortune."

Discussion Forum Reflection & Response Webinars: Following each written discussion forum, facilitators will reflect upon the postings in an interactive webinar with course participants.

Roundtable Discussion Webinars: Renowned special quests will be available for a moderated discussion with panelists and course participants.

Final Projects: Participants will be asked to share a creative project that represents a vision of their own communities in "the aftermath of the market economy" for our concluding Online Convivial Carnival.

Online Convivial Carnival Webinar: A BYOB online event, our celebratory wrap-up discussion will feature reflections on participants' creative submissions of how they see how their own communities might opt to survive the future.

Course Facilitators

Philip Ackerman-Leist leads and teaches in Sterling's continuing education program, The School of the New American Farmstead, with its leading-edge short courses that inspire lifelong environmental stewardship for residential and non-residential adult students of all ages. Philip is also the author of *A Precautionary Tale, Rebuilding the Foodshed*, and *Up Tunket Road*, published by Chelsea Green Publishing. He farmed and taught at Brunnenburg Castle & Agricultural Museum in the Italian Alps before going to Green Mountain College in Vermont, where he was Professor of Sustainable Agriculture & Food Systems at Green Mountain College and established the first online graduate program in Sustainable Food Systems in the U.S. He manages a grass-based herd of rare breed cattle, American Milking Devons, on his home farm in Pawlet, Vermont.

Shaun Chamberlin has been involved with the Transition Network since its inception, co-founding Transition Town Kingston and authoring the movement's second book, The Transition Timeline. He is managing director of the Fleming Policy Centre, former chair of the Ecological Land Co-operative, and has spoken at venues ranging from Occupy camps to parliaments. In exploring the cultural narratives charting society's course forward, he has written for or edited a diverse range of books, magazines, academic journals, and other publications, including co-authoring a significant UK All Party Parliamentary report with his close friend and regular collaborator, David Fleming. Sterling College President Matthew Derr is nationally recognized in higher education for his expertise in leading institutional change and for strengthening mission-based focus. In 2011, He was awarded a Council for Advancement and Support of Education Chief Executive of the Year Award. Derr led the effort to divest the Sterling endowment from fossil fuels, founded the Fried Center for Sustainable Agriculture & Food Systems, and recently launched an effort with The Berry Center to expand the reach of farmer education. Prior to Sterling, President Derr served as Interim President of Antioch College, where, he developed a concept for a new curriculum focused on issues related to environmental stewardship, inspired by Sterling. Unusually for a college president, Derr also fulfills a role as a faculty member and teaches community organizing.
